# MAKE YOUR MARK... ADOPT A TEMPE PARK!



Tempe's [Adopt-A-Park, Adopt-A-Street and Adopt-A-Path programs](#) can be the perfect reason to get together, enjoy the nice weather and participate in some selfless service while enhancing the appearance, safety and cleanliness of Tempe.

The Adopt-A-Park program responsibilities include picking up trash and litter; raking leaves, pulling weeds and fluffing playground sand; sanitizing playground equipment with soap and

water; sweeping all hard surfaces (i.e. basketball courts, sidewalks, ramadas, etc.); reporting any vandalism, dirty restrooms, unsafe conditions and/or necessary repairs; and completing any special projects that may be assigned by Parks staff.

The Adopt-A-Street and Adopt-A-Path programs support litter control and storm water management throughout Tempe. The length of an adoptable street and/or path is a minimum of one mile, but no more than two miles. The commitment is a few hours each cleaning period with a minimum of one clean up every three months for two years. Signs providing information related to the litter control effort and crediting the volunteer or sponsor organization are paid for and installed by the city.

There are year-round opportunities for groups. All of Tempe's 48 parks, major streets and some side streets, as well as most of Tempe's multi-use paths, are available for adoption. For more information, visit [www.Tempe.gov/Adopt](http://www.Tempe.gov/Adopt).



## LEAVE A LEARNING LEGACY WITH EXPERIENCE CORPS

In partnership with [AARP](#), the City of Tempe offers a unique volunteer opportunity for adults 50+ to work with elementary school children. AARP Experience Corps is a nationally recognized literacy program currently running in 19 cities across the country. More than 2,000 volunteers nationwide make this program possible and create a significant impact in their communities.

In Tempe, there are 57 volunteers who work in seven Tempe and Kyrene elementary schools. Volunteers work one-on-one with third grade students, helping them improve their literacy skills.

This fall, [Tempe's AARP Experience Corps](#) program is expanding into three new schools and is looking to add approximately 30 more volunteers to help keep the program growing. Volunteers do not need any special skills, just a willingness to share their experience, time and patience. Comprehensive training, support services and orientation are provided.

## HELP BUILD A NEW HOME IN TEMPE

The City of Tempe and Habitat for Humanity Central Arizona (HFHCAZ) are teaming up with the Ramsey Social Justice Foundation, SRP and the East Valley Catholic Coalition to provide three Tempe families each with a new LEED Platinum Certified home in 2013.

The Habitat builds are part of Tempe's focused neighborhood revitalization effort to help stabilize our neighborhoods. By partnering with organizations like HFHCAZ, the City of Tempe is able to leverage our resources to maximize the positive impact on the community. Converting vacant lots and abandoned properties into affordable housing options for our residents also helps reduce the opportunities for illegal dumping and graffiti.

Ground broke on the Andrade home on Jan. 5. The home building process will take place each Saturday through May and the community is invited to help. The Tempe Community Action Agency is [recruiting volunteers](#). No experience is necessary and participants need to be 16 years or older.

Tempe's neighborhood and community spaces and help improve quality of life in Tempe.

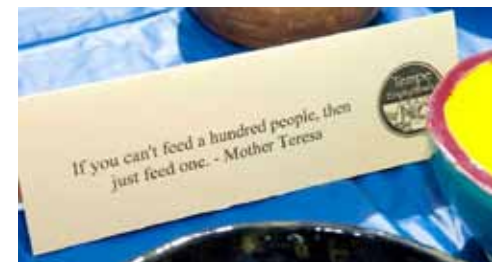

# CARE 7 VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR: LEON DEHAVEN

Tempe's [CARE 7 Crisis Response Team](#) is a group of dedicated and professionally trained staff and community volunteers who provide 24-hour, on-scene, crisis intervention services in Tempe. CARE 7 is dispatched to calls through the emergency 911 system and responds to traumatic incidents, sexual assaults, homicides, robberies, attempted or completed suicides, drownings, domestic violence incidents, house fires, loss of loved ones and serious injury accidents.

On the crisis scene, CARE 7 is able to fully focus on the emotional and practical needs of the family and/or individual in crisis while Tempe Police and Fire personnel attend to law enforcement, medical emergency, and fire suppression needs.

Care 7 is pleased to announce that the 2012 recipient of the CARE 7 Sandi Daley Exceptional Service Award is Leon DeHaven. Leon shows dedication and enthusiasm while helping the Care 7 staff during each of his volunteer shifts. Not only is he an engaged volunteer, but he is always willing to go above and beyond.

One of Leon's most recent accomplishments was assisting CARE 7 with a domestic violence call that required extensive collaboration. The call would have been much more difficult without Leon's ability to remain calm, engage the victim and amuse her children. As a result, CARE 7 was able to put the victim and her children on a bus to a safe place. This could not have been done without Leon's encouragement and expert bus ticket Googling abilities.

The CARE 7 Sandi Daley Exceptional Service Award is named after one of the program's most memorable volunteers. Sandi began volunteering with CARE 7 in 2001. She had experience dealing with medical emergencies as a flight attendant



and wanted to help other people at critical times in their lives. Sandi always had a smile on her face and a compassion for others. She was prepared to do anything and everything that was asked of her.

After Sandi died in a helicopter accident on Feb. 22, 2006, CARE 7 decided to honor her spirit by instituting the CARE 7 Sandi Daley Exceptional Service Award in 2007. The award has been given to the volunteer who has gone above and beyond – just like Sandi always did. Past recipients include: Sharon Meyers (2007), Bob Rose (2008), Beverly Adams (2009), Beth Gross (2010), and Jim Gallagher (2011).

# TEMPE'S GREEN REVOLUTION

Tempe is going green! The "Green Revolution," an eco-friendly, minimal carbon footprint exhibit, created by the [Museum of Science and Industry](#) in Chicago and distributed by the [Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service](#) (SITES), will debut at the Tempe Center for the Arts from Jan. 19 through May 25.

"Green Revolution" engages children and their families by addressing critical issues concerning the future health of the planet. Tempe worked with local artists and organizations to create an interactive exhibition that combines the arts and sciences, teaching community members about "going green" in Arizona.

The typical recipe for a traveling museum exhibition is to pack objects into crates, load them onto trucks, and then have those trucks travel the highways to museums across the country. "Green Revolution," however, is an innovative museum exhibit with virtually no carbon footprint. Participating venues receive all of the necessary design files and instructions digitally, allowing them to construct their very own home grown "eco-zibit" from re-used, recycled materials found within the local community.

In addition to visiting this interactive and educational exhibit, Tempe Center for the Arts will be offering upcoming
