#### **Under Construction**

In the coming months, the museum building will be undergoing significant changes that will impact operations. Once the exhibit gallery closes to the public, there will be no access through the front doors for most of the year. However, that doesn't mean the staff are going away!

The museum staff will continue to work in the building and can be reached by phone or email. Staff will be busy keeping pace with the progress of the exhibit design and fabrication, writing the exhibit text, creating graphic panels, preparing artifacts for exhibit, reproducing photographs, and designing hands-on activities.

Research, collection and photographic reproduction services will still be available. Appointments will need to be made in advance so that requests for services can be accommodated and researchers can be given access to the building. Please be mindful that the staff will not be able to guarantee that immediate access will be given to anyone who chooses to come to the museum without an appointment.

Ongoing programs, such as the *Third Thirstday Night Café* and the *Tempe Historical Society Lunch Talks* will continue on their regular schedules. However, they will take place at the Tempe Public Library (see calendar on page 3).

The Petersen House Museum will remain open Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 10 am to 2 pm for guided tours. If you would like to bring a group of nine or more to tour the House, please call 480-350-5100 to schedule a docent for your group. #### **New Exhibit**

The City of Tempe says goodbye to 121 years of newspaper coverage by the East Valley Tribune in January. #### A Proud Journey Home: Cambodian, Laotian and Vietnamese Communities in Arizona

#### **Programs Honor Veterans**



Arizona State Historian and Arizona Veteran's Hall of Fame inductee, **Marshall Trimble**, participated in the program on November 7.

A special fundraising luncheon program, From Baghdad with Love, was held on November 7. The event, which honored United States veterans, was cosponsored by the Arizona Veteran's Hall of Fame (AVHOF), Kiwanis International Nuevo Club, and the Tempe Historical Museum. The featured speaker, Marine Lieutenant Colonel Jay Kopelman, told the true story of the rescue of a puppy named Lava during the U.S.-led attack on Fallujah, Iraq. These events are included in Lt. Col. Kopelman's book, From Baghdad with Love.

The luncheon was primarily organized by Tempe Historical Museum Advisory Board mem-

ber **Frank Schmuck**, who is also the President of the AVHOF Society, and an AVHOF inductee. Other veterans participated in the luncheon program, including Arizona State Historian **Marshall Trimble**, and former Maricopa County Attorney **Rick Romley**. Both of them have also been inducted into the Arizona Veteran's Hall of Fame.

Induction into the Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame is the highest honor awarded by the Governor's Office to veterans for their contributions outside of their military service. With more than 60,000 veterans estimated to live in Arizona, just 164 have been recognized since the program's inception in 2001. This year, **William H. Wallace**, a Tempe Historical Society member and long-time museum volunteer, was among 20 veterans inducted into the Hall of Fame. "Bill" Wallace has been a member of the Tempe Historical Society for many years, and has served as its president. He has coordinated golf tournaments and put together a veterans' lunch that featured various veterans telling stories about their military service, as fundraisers for the Society. Bill also served as a docent at the museum.
